to lick

present tense

Some French verbs change their spelling as you conjugate them, especially in the *nous* and *vous* forms. **LÉCHER** is one of them. The spelling change in this case is on the accent.

pronoun	conjugation	English
je	lèche	I lick
tu	lèches	you lick
elle	lèche	she licks
il/ça	lèche	he/it licks
on	lèche	we lick
nous	léchons	we lick
vous	léchez	you lick
ils	lèchent	they lick
elles	lèchent	they lick

In context

I'm licking the ice-cream off my hand.
→ Je lèche la glace de ma main.

We don't often go window shopping.
[We don't often go licking store windows.]
→ Nous ne léchons pas souvent les vitrines.
→ On [ne] lèche pas souvent les vitrines. [*more colloquial*]
